FROM THE President

For the past several months I have been highlighting what social events occur in Germany. March is, perhaps, the least active month for festivals in Germany. With the Lenten season in full swing [March is usually the month with the most days in Lent], there aren't many festivals. Christians are observing Lenten customs such as refraining from meat or other foods and spending time in prayer and assisting others. Yet, there is the *Starkbierfest* in Munich, which is a somewhat unpublicized event. It is rather low key because it is Lent after all. Starkbiers are Bavaria's stronger beers and so, many locals will gather for these special beers at well-known beer halls and breweries, such as Paulaner, Hacker-Pschorr, Hofbräu, Spaten, Augustiner, and others. A smaller brewery named Schneiders has a particularly good offering called Aventinus. Aventinus can be found here in Terre Haute.

Non-beer-centric festivals are the Cologne International Literature Festival which highlights writers, illustrators, and musicians. Events take place throughout the city. Another event is the Leipzig Book Fair. Since it is in the spring it previews upcoming books and media. It lasts four days.

Of course, if Easter [Ostern, Osterfest] falls in March Holy Week takes up seven days. This year Ostern falls on 31 March, so Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on 24 March, known as Palmarum. An interesting event is the Osterfeuer, or Easter fire. These are very large fires. These are said to be linked to the lighting of the Paschal Candle used in Lutheran and Roman Catholic Easter Vigils [Saturday evening]. Fredericksburg, Texas, holds numerous fires on about 20 hills outside the town.

There are some culinary customs as well. Osterbrot [Easter bread] is baked. It is more sweet than regular bread. It may be sold as yeast buns or as a woven wreath. Our traditional Easter breakfast often features a variety of sweet breads. Why sweet? Because of the Lenten fast and the forgoing of sugary treats.

Switching gears from the lovely customs mentioned in past articles, our Klub has come to a crossroads as to whether or not we shall be able to continue with our annual Oktoberfest at the fairgrounds. This is due to one major problem—THE LACK OF SUFFICIENT VOLUNTEERS to carry it off. It's no secret that our membership's median age is past retirement. Without sufficient volunteers who can set up and take down all that is needed it may not be physically possible to continue as we have in the past. At our monthly membership meeting this past Thursday [28 February] we discussed these issues at length. Many ideas were discussed, but there really weren't enough members present to reach consensus.
